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Independent Auditors' Report

To the Board of Directors Global Outreach Charter Academy, Inc. Jacksonville, Florida

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Global Outreach Charter Academy, Inc., (the School), which is a component unit of the Duval County Public Schools, Florida, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2020 and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the School's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Opinions

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Global Outreach Charter Academy, Inc., as of June 30, 2020, and the respective changes in financial position, thereof for the year then ended, in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis and the budgetary comparison information listed in the table of contents be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the School's basic financial statements. The Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards and notes thereto are presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Part 200, *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards* and is also not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards and notes thereto are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated September 28, 2020, on our consideration of Global Outreach Charter Academy, Inc.'s internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grants agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of Global Outreach Charter Academy, Inc.'s internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the School's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

The Global Outreach Charter Academy, Inc.'s (the "School") management discussion and analysis is designed to (a) assist the reader in focusing on significant financial issues, (b) provide an overview of the School's financial activity, (c) identify changes in the School's financial position (its ability to address the next and subsequent year challenges), (d) identify any material deviations from the financial plan (the approved budget), and (e) identify individual fund issues or concerns. Since the Management's Discussion and Analysis (MD&A) is designed to focus on the current year's activities, resulting changes and currently known facts, please read it in conjunction with the School's financial statements which follows this discussion.

Financial Highlights

- The assets of the School exceeded its liabilities at June 30, 2020 by \$1,461,582. The School's enrollment was 990 students for the fiscal year. In March 2020, the School operations were suspended for a time due to the Coronavirus pandemic. In April 2020, the School re-opened virtually to finish out the School year. The full financial impact of the Coronavirus pandemic cannot be determined.
- The School's total net position decreased by \$349,256. This decrease can be attributed to a reduction in federal operating grants received and increases in operational spending.
- The School moved its facilities to new buildings in fiscal year 2020/2021. The School incurred a property and equipment disposal loss of \$164 thousand due to the loss of leasehold improvement assets as a result of the move.
- Expenses increased by \$2.17 million (30%) compared to the prior fiscal year. The School spent additional funds on instruction, approximately \$900 thousand and facilities and plant, approximately \$880 thousand. The School spent additional funds to attract more teachers with higher pay and benefits. Also, the School incurred additional expenses while in transition to permanent facilities in FY 2020/2021.
- The School borrowed long-term funds in the current fiscal year. A working capital loan of \$2.251 million was borrowed, which was part of the long-term bond financing of a new school to be purchased in fiscal year 2020/2021. In addition, the School borrowed \$977 thousand in funds from the U.S. Small Business Administration as part of the Payroll Protection Program. This loan is expected to be forgiven.
- The School received additional capital outlay funding to help pay for facility expenses and a small state grant for the Arts program. Net federal and state grant funding for the School increased by approximately \$42,000 (2.5%) compared to the prior fiscal year.
- The Duval County Public Schools and the federal government provided 21st Century grant funds to the School in the amount of \$147,128, which was a decrease of approximately \$91,000 compared to the prior year. These monies were provided to help improve student scores and overall educational achievements.
- As of June 30, 2020, the School's governmental funds reported positive ending fund balances
 of \$4,681,209 an increase of \$3.26 million. The increase can be attributed debt proceeds
 received in the amount of \$3.23 million.

USING THIS ANNUAL REPORT

The financial statement's focus is on both the School as a whole (government-wide) and on the major individual funds. Both perspectives (government-wide and major fund) allow the user to address relevant questions, broaden a basis for comparison and enhance the School's accountability. This discussion and analysis is intended to serve as an introduction to the Global Outreach Charter Academy, Inc. basic financial statements, which are comprised of three components: 1) government-wide financial statements, 2) fund financial statements, and 3) notes to the financial statements.

Government-wide financial statements

The government-wide financial statements are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of the School's finances, in a manner similar to a private-sector business. The focus is on "activities", rather than "fund types".

The statement of net position presents information on all of the School's assets and liabilities, with the difference between the two reported as net position. The focus of the statement of net position (the "unrestricted net position") is designed to be similar to bottom line results for the School and its governmental activities. This statement combines and consolidates the governmental fund's current resources (short-term spendable resources) with capital assets and long-term obligations. Over time, the increases or decreases in net position may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position of the School is improving or deteriorating.

The statement of activities presents information showing how the School's net position changed during the most recent fiscal year, focusing on both the gross and net costs of various governmental activities that are supported by the School's operating and other revenues. This is intended to summarize and simplify the user's analysis of the cost of various governmental services.

The government-wide financial statements distinguish functions of the School that are principally supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues (governmental activities). The governmental activities of the School include instruction, general support, administration, pupil transportation, operation and maintenance of plant and community services.

The government-wide financial statements, which can be found following this discussion, include only the Global Outreach Charter Academy, Inc., which is known as the primary government. The School has no component units.

Fund financial statements

A fund is a grouping of related accounts that is used to maintain control over the resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. The School, like other state and local governments, uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements. All of the funds of the School can be included as governmental funds. Traditional users of governmental financial statements will find the fund financial statements presentation more familiar.

Governmental funds

Governmental funds are used to account for essentially the same functions reported as governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. However, unlike the government-wide financial statements, governmental fund financial statements focus on near-term inflows and outflows of spending resources, as well as on balances of spendable resources available at the end of the fiscal year. Such information may be useful in evaluating the School's near-term financing requirements.

Because the focus of governmental funds is narrower than that of the government-wide financial statements, it is useful to compare the information presented for governmental funds with similar information presented for governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. By doing so, readers may better understand the long-term impact of the School's near-term financing decisions. Both the governmental fund Balance Sheet and the governmental fund Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balances provide a reconciliation to facilitate this comparison between governmental funds and government-wide activities.

The School maintains two individual governmental funds, which are named the General Fund and the Special Revenue Fund. They are both considered major funds. The School adopts an annual appropriated budget for both funds. Budgetary comparison statements have been provided for both funds to demonstrate compliance with the budget. The School's budget was amended during the year for unexpected revenues and expenditures received and spent during the fiscal year.

Governmental funds (concluded)

Notes to the financial statements

The notes provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the government-wide and fund financial statements. They can be found following this discussion.

Government-wide financial statements - Analysis

Statement of Net Position

As noted earlier, net position may serve over time as a useful indicator of a government's financial position. For the current year, the School's assets exceeded their liabilities by \$1,461,582.

Statement of Net Position

The School has \$74,793 invested in capital assets (e.g. land, buildings, improvements, vehicles and equipment) less any related debt used to acquire those assets that is still outstanding. The School uses these assets to provide services to its students and this portion of net position is not available for future spending.

The School received more in capital outlay grant funds compared to the prior year. The School received Title I federal funds which are designated to help schools with a high percentage of disadvantaged children. The School received Title II federal funds which are designed for teacher and Principal training. The Duval County Public Schools and the federal government provided 21st Century grant funds to the School in the amount of \$147,127 to help improve student scores and overall educational achievements.

The School also received revenues totaling \$440,404 for their participation in the National School Lunch and Breakfast Programs based on community eligibility provision. There was a reduction of \$76K in this grant due to the closure of the School as a result of the Coronavirus pandemic. The School provides breakfast, lunch and an after-school snack to all students. The meals are provided free for all families.

Governmental activities decreased the School's net position by \$349,256. The School spent additional funds on instruction, facilities, food services, School administration and interest.

Financial Analysis of the fund financial statements and notes

Governmental funds

The School uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with legal requirements. The focus of the School's governmental funds is to provide information on near-term inflows, outflows and balances of spendable resources. Such information is useful in assessing the School's financing requirements. In addition, fund balances may serve as a useful measure of a government's net resources available for spending at the end of the fiscal year. As of June 30, 2020, the School's governmental funds, which include the General Fund and the Special Revenue Fund, reported a positive ending fund balance of \$4,681,209. The increase can be attributed to the receipt of debt proceeds in the amount of \$3.23 million.

As a measure of the General Fund's liquidity, it may be useful to compare unreserved fund balance to total fund expenditures. The unreserved fund balance represents 35 percent of total General Fund expenditures. The General Fund's unreserved fund balance increased by \$1,088,704 in the current fiscal year. The increase was a result of receiving Payroll Protection funds in the amount of \$977K during the year. This loan is expected to be forgiven.

The School adopted budgets for the general fund and the special revenue fund. The budget was amended for unexpected revenues, including grant revenues received during the fiscal year and debt proceeds received.

Long-term liabilities

The School allowed full-time staff to carryover paid time off to future years. In previous years, the School did not allow carryover of paid time off. The School's Board of Directors allowed a one-time exception for these hours to be used in fiscal year 2020/2021. The School's accrued compensated absence liability increased from zero to \$75,497. A working capital loan of \$2.251 million was borrowed, which was part of the long-term bond financing of a new school to be purchased in fiscal year 2020/2021. Interest expense of \$98K was incurred on this loan. In addition, the School borrowed \$977K in funds from the U.S. Small Business Administration as part of the Payroll Protection Program. These loan funds are expected to be forgiven.

Capital assets

The School's investment in capital assets for its governmental activities as of June 30, 2020 amounts to \$74,793 (net of accumulated depreciation). This investment in capital assets include leasehold improvements, desks, tables, chairs, and computer equipment. Additional information can be found in the Notes to the Financial Statement. The following summary shows the capital assets of the School.

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The accounting policies of the Global Outreach Charter Academy, Inc. (the School) conform to generally accepted accounting principles as applicable to governments. The following is a summary of the more significant accounting policies of the School.

A. Reporting entity

Global Outreach Charter Academy, Inc. was formed in November 2008 to operate as a charter school in Duval County, Florida. The School was granted a charter in 2009 and opened in August 2009. The general operating authority of the School is contained in Section 1002.33, Florida Statutes. The School operates under a charter of the sponsoring school district, the Duval County Public Schools (the District). The original charter school contract was effective July 1, 2009 and was renewed twice by the District through June 30, 2024. In accordance with Florida Statutes the District will evaluate the School's charter contract every five years. As a result of that evaluation, the District may or may not renew the contract. During the term of this contract, the District may terminate the contract for cause. In the event of termination of this contract, property purchased by the School with public funds reverts back to the District. The School is considered a component unit of the District.

Generally accepted accounting principles require that the financial statements present the School (the primary government) and any component units. Component units generally are legally separate entities for which a primary government is financially accountable. Financial accountability ordinarily involves meeting both of the following criteria: the primary government is accountable for the potential component unit (i.e., the primary government appoints the voting majority of its School) and the primary government is able to impose its will upon the potential component unit, or there is a possibility that the potential component unit may provide specific financial benefits or impose specific financial burdens on the primary government. The School does not have any entities that would be considered component units of the School.

B. Government-wide and fund financial statements

The government-wide financial statements (i.e., the Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities) report information on all of the nonfiduciary activities of the School. For the most part, the effect of interfund activity has been removed from these statements. *Governmental activities*, which normally are supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues, are separate from *business-type activities*, which rely to a significant extent on fees and charges for support. The School does not engage in any business-type activities.

The Statement of Activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses of a given function or segments are offset by program revenues. Direct expenses are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific function or segment. Program revenues include 1) charges to individuals who directly benefit from goods, services or privileges provided by a given function or segment: and 2) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function or segment. Taxes and other items not properly included among program revenues are reported instead as general revenues.

Separate financial statements are provided for governmental funds. Major individual governmental funds are reported as separate columns in the fund financial statements. GASB Statement No. 34 Basic Financial Statements and Management Discussion and Analysis for State and local Governments sets forth minimum criteria (percentage of the assets, liabilities, revenues or expenditures/expenses of either fund category or the governmental funds) for the determination of major funds. There were no non-major funds.

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

C. Measurement focus, basis of accounting and financial statement presentation

The government-wide financial statements are reported using the *economic resources measurement focus* and the *accrual basis of accounting*. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Revenues and operating funds received from the District are recognized as FTE's are determined for the year. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been met.

Governmental fund financial statements are reported using the *current financial resources measurement focus* and the *modified accrual basis of accounting*. Revenues are recognized as soon as they are both measurable and available. Revenues are considered to be available when they are collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay liabilities of the current period. For this purpose, the School considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 60 days of the end of the current fiscal period. Expenditures generally are recorded when a liability is incurred, as under accrual accounting. However, debt service expenditures, as well as expenditures related to compensated absences and claims and judgments, are recorded only when payment is due.

Florida Education Finance Program revenues associated with the current fiscal period are all considered to be susceptible to accrual and so have been recognized as revenues of the current fiscal period. All other revenue items are considered to be measurable and available within 60 days of the end of the current fiscal period.

The School reports the following major governmental funds:

The General Fund is the School's primary operating fund, and is used to account for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund. All general revenues and other receipts that are not allocated by law or contractual agreement to another fund are accounted for in this fund. The majority of current operating expenditures of the School are financed through revenues received through the Florida Education Finance Program as administered by the District.

The Special Revenue Fund is used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources (other than expendable trusts or major capital projects) that are restricted or committed for specified purposes. Currently, the funds restricted by the School are federal grant funds received in fiscal year 2019-2020, such as Title I School wide Entitlement and School Program Improvement Plan funds, Title II Training funds, Title IV funds, 21st Century grant funds, National School Lunch and Breakfast Program funds. The School also received restricted state capital outlay funds in fiscal year 2019-2020.

As a general rule, the effect of interfund activity has been eliminated from the government-wide financial statements. When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the School's policy to use restricted resources first, then unrestricted as they are needed.

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

D. Assets, liabilities and fund position

1. Deposits and investments

The School's deposits are kept in FDIC insured financial institutions. FDIC financial institutions provide up to \$250,000 in deposit insurance coverage for corporate accounts at all of its institutions. The School's total bank balances on deposit were \$4,620,286, at June 30, 2020. The bank balances exceeded FDIC insurance by approximately \$4,120,286.

2. Capital assets

Capital assets, which include property and equipment, are reported in the applicable governmental columns in the governmental-wide finance statement. Capital assets are defined by the School, as items with an individual cost of \$1,000 or more and an estimated useful life of more than one year. All purchased assets are recorded at historical cost. Donated assets are recorded at estimated fair market value at the date of donation.

The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extended asset lives are not capitalized. Major outlays for capital assets and improvements are capitalized as projects are constructed. Depreciation on all assets is provided on the straight-line basis over the following estimated useful lives. Furniture, fixtures, and equipment are depreciated over 3-10 years. Leasehold improvements are being depreciated over 15 years.

3. Restricted assets

Certain assets of the governmental activities, representing cash and investments, might be classified as restricted on the statement of net position if they are limited as to use by Federal, State or local law or creditors. As of June 30, 2020, unspent restricted funds were \$2,167,773. These funds were restricted for use by the provisions of a working capital loan received during the year.

4. Fund balances

The School has adopted GASB Statement No. 54, which redefined how fund balances of the governmental funds are presented in the financial statements. Fund balances are classified as follows:

Nonspendable - Amounts that cannot be spent either because they are not in a spendable form or because they are legally or contractually required to be maintained intact.

Restricted – Are amounts that can be spent only for specific purposes because of state or federal laws, or externally imposed conditions by grantors or creditors.

Committed – Are amounts that can be used only for specific purposes determined by a formal action by the School's Board of Directors.

Assigned – Are amounts that are designated by the Board of Directors for a specific purpose but are not spendable until a budget amendment is passed by Board of Directors.

Unassigned - All amounts not included in other spendable classifications. The fund balance as of June 30, 2020 for the General Fund is considered unassigned.

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (concluded)

5. Credit Line

The School received a credit line of \$100,000 from a local financial institution. The balance on the credit line as of June 30, 2020 was \$0.

E. Revenue sources

Revenues for current operations are received primarily from the State of Florida which is passed through the District pursuant to funding provisions included in Florida Statutes and the charter agreement with the District. In accordance with the funding provisions of the charter agreement and Section 1002.33(17), Florida Statutes, funding is based on the number of FTE students and related data. Funding for the School is adjusted during the year to reflect revised calculations and actual weighted FTE students reported by the School during designated FTE student survey periods.

The Organization received federal awards passed through the State of Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services and the District to fund various capital outlay costs incurred by the School and to provide instruction to low income students under the federal Title I program. The School also receives federal and state funds to provide reduced price and free meals to eligible students. These federal awards have requirements whereby the earning of grant funds are dependent upon the qualifying expenditures being incurred and that certain eligibility requirements are met.

F. Pension plans

The School adopted a 403(b) Non-ERISA pension plan for employees. The plan is currently funded by employee contributions only. Currently there are no participants in this plan.

The School adopted a 401(K) pension plan for employees in November 2018. The plan is funded by employee contributions with an annual match of .25 cents per dollar contributed up to a 3% match. The company contribution is capped at \$500 per employee. In fiscal year 2019-2020, the School matching contribution was \$8,989.

Note 2 - Reconciliation of Government-wide and Fund Financial Statements

Explanation of certain differences between the governmental fund balance sheet and the government-wide statement of net position

The governmental fund balance sheet includes reconciliation between *fund balance* – *total governmental funds* and *net position* - *governmental activities* as reported in the government-wide statement of net position.

Explanation of certain differences between the governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balances and the government-wide statement of activities

The governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balances includes reconciliation between *net changes in fund balances* – *total governmental funds* and *changes in net position of governmental activities* as reported in the government-wide statement of activities.

Note 3 - Detailed Notes on all Funds

A. Facility leases

In fiscal year 2019/2020, the School leased its facilities from an independent commercial property management company. The School agreed to lease multiple buildings, equipment through June 30, 2020. Total rent and security deposits paid by the School during the fiscal year were \$1,409,765. The School also paid a one-time engagement fee of \$212,000 with Lonestar School Development for the lease of property.

C. Long-Term Liabilities

The School allows administrative and operational full-time staff to carryover a limited amount of paid time off to be carried over from one fiscal year to the next. As of June 30, 2020, the School recorded \$75,497 in accrued compensated absences. The School recorded \$24,897 as the current portion of this long-term debt.

In September 2019, the School closed on a cash collateral loan totaling \$2,251,632. This loan is to be used for working capital and pay for loan closing costs of \$70,000 in fiscal year 2020/2021. The loan interest rate is 5.5% and the School is required to make semi-annual interest payments until June 30, 2022 when principal payments will be required. The loan amortization will be based on a twenty-five year amortization, starting June 30, 2022. However, the loan has a balloon payment due of \$1,860,401 due on August 1, 2029.

In May 2020, the School borrowed \$977,291 from the Small Business Administration to help with payroll costs as allowed by the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act. The interest rate is 1% and the loan documents require repayment within 24 months. However, the School expects to apply and receive forgiveness of this loan. The School has ten months from the loan date to apply for forgiveness of the loan and convert the loan to a grant. The School expects to qualify for loan forgiveness. However, until the loan is forgiven, it will be reported as long-term debt.

E. Operating leases - Minimum lease payments

The School has agreed to lease property annually through the fiscal year June 30, 2020 for two different locations. The Regency Square location was being lease for the school year. The Lonestar Road location is leased for the next three fiscal years. In July 2019, the School paid \$212,000 to the landlord of the Lonestar Road location to renovate and improve that property. Note 4 – Income Taxes

The School received exempt status, effective November 10, 2008 from the Internal Revenue Service as a 501(c)(3) organizations. Contributions made to the School are deductible under Section 170 of the Internal Revenue Code. Annually, the School is required to file form 990, Return of Organization Exempt from Income Tax. In addition, the School is registered with the State of Florida as a Charitable Organization with the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services. The IRS can audit the three most previous tax periods. The years subject to audit are the fiscal years ending June 30, 2018, 2019 and 2020.

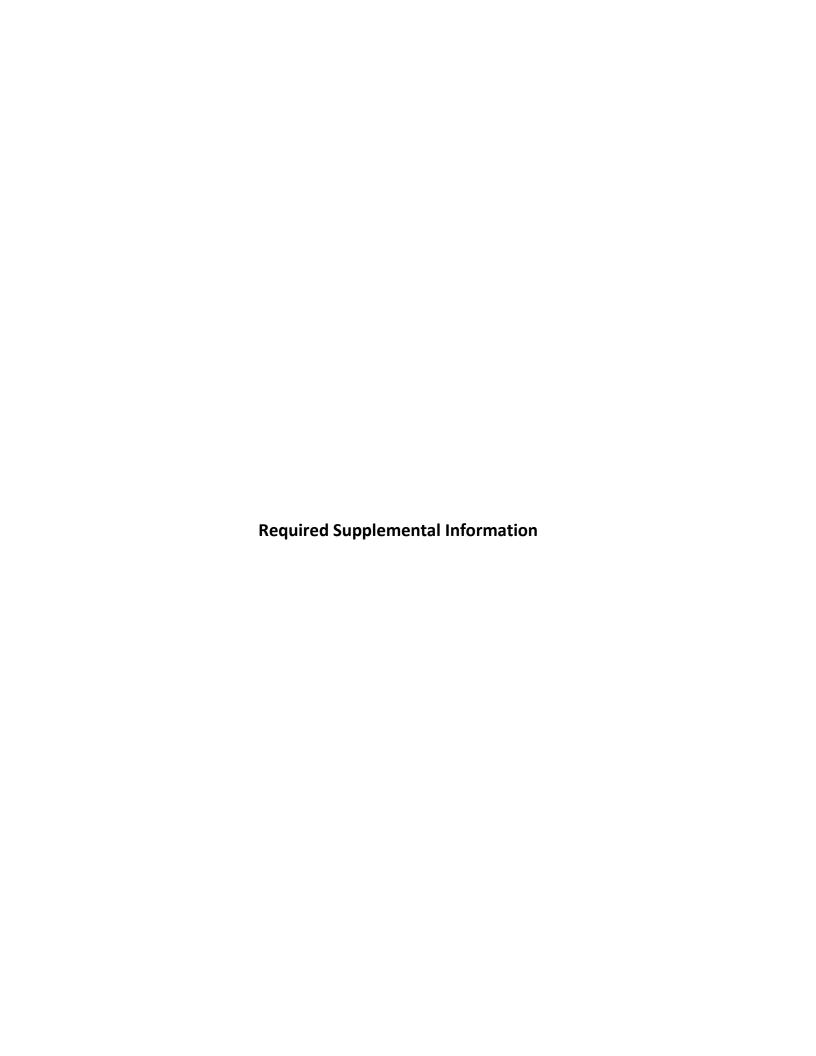
Note 5 - Risk Management

The School purchased insurance to limit the exposure of the following risks of loss: theft of, damage to and destruction of assets; natural disasters and injuries to employees. Commercial insurance has also been purchased by the School to cover the risks of loss due to employee errors or omissions and health insurance. Settled claims resulting from these risks have not exceeded insurance coverage in the first year of operation.

Note 6 – Subsequent Event

Generally accepted accounting principles require the disclosure of significant events or transactions that occur after the balance sheet date but before the financial statements are issued. Management has evaluated subsequent events through September 28, 2020 and found the following significant events or transactions that should be disclosed, which is described below. The evaluation date is considered to be the date the financial statements are available to be issued.

The School received approval to open an additional charter school for high school students. This new School opened in August 2020. Global Outreach Charter Academy, Inc. is working on purchasing and refurbishing property for the new high school. In September 2019, the School entered into a purchase and sale agreement to buy land and buildings that will house both schools. The purchase price of the property is \$18.4 million. The School expects 100% financing of this purchase. This loan is expected to close in the fall of 2020.

Stewardship, compliance and accountability - budgets and budgetary accounting

Annual budgets are legally adopted for all funds. Each budget is prepared on a basis which does not differ materially from generally accepted accounting principles. Budget amounts reflected in the accompanying financial statements represent original and budgetary data. The final budgetary data includes the effects of budget amendments. The legal level of budgetary control is the fund level.

The Administration of the School prepares an estimate of revenues and School expenditures for the upcoming fiscal year. Revenues are budgeted based on an estimate of student enrollment and approved grant funding. Expenditures are budgeted based on staff levels needed to teach students and costs of administration and facilities. The overall budget is then presented to and approved by the Board of Directors.
